## **Training certificates**

# ATTENTION, ATTACHMENT & ADDICTION: ROLE OF MEDIA IN EARLY DEVELOPMENT

This workshop brings you some of the most compelling research on media overuse and its impact on early development. We'll explore how heavy exposure to screens can interfere with a child's ability to focus, form secure attachments, and grow socially and emotionally — all foundational to healthy learning and relationships.

But this isn't just about what's going wrong. It's also about what we can do.

Educators will leave equipped with current, research-backed knowledge they can share with families, along with practical, classroom-friendly strategies. The workshop also introduces Imaginative Education — a powerful, story- and emotion-driven approach to re-engaging children in a world beyond screens.

**Presenter:** Dr. Kym Stewart holds a PhD in Education and an M.A in Communication Studies from Simon Fraser University. # ALERT EMERGENCY CHILDCARE FIRST AID CPR - LEVEL C

This fun and interactive 8 hour course trains people how to react and improvise when dealing with life threatening emergencies. This course includes initial assessment, disease prevention, secondary survey, airway obstruction, adult, child and infant CPR and AED (level C). Recognition and first-aid treatment for head and spine injuries, shock, burns, bleeding, seizures, broken bones, anaphylactic shock, small wound management, poisoning, heat exhaustion and heat stroke will also be addressed. Participants spend the majority of the course doing hands on first-aid and participating in first-aid scenarios. By practicing with scenarios students gain confidence, learn to improvise, and react in emergency situations. This course meets Child Licensing guidelines.

# INDIGENOUS DREAM CATCHER WORKSHOP

Asibikaashi, the Spider Woman; In Ojibwe tradition, she would weave intricate webs to catch negative spirits, allowing positive dreams to reach the sleeper. It was believed that the web would catch the bad dreams and hold them until morning when sunlight would destroy them. Over time, the practice was shared and adapted by other Indigenous people. The designs and uses may vary from tribe to tribe, but the core idea of protection whether from bad dreams, bad energy, or harmful spirits remained the same.

- The circle represents the circle of life or the universe.
- The web symbolizes the interconnectedness of all things, that good energy can flow freely, while negative energy gets caught in the web.
- The feathers and beads attached to dream catchers are symbols of protection and a connection to the natural world. Feathers, in particular, were often connected with spiritual guides or ancestors.

People sometimes overlook the cultural significance and treat them as purely decorative items. For many Indigenous people, dream catchers continue to carry deep spiritual meaning and connection to their culture.

**Presenter:** Janet Crockford is a Katzie Elder who lives on the Walnut Grove Langley Reserve #2. She shared her home there with her late husband of 39 years, and together they raised two adult children. Janet dedicated 27 years to the Langley School District's Aboriginal Program and spent an additional 5 years with the Surrey Aboriginal Learning program. Throughout her life, she has remained committed to deepening her understanding of her culture and has spent the past 34 years passionately sharing that knowledge with others. She holds strong values rooted in respect for the land and animals and continues to live by and teach these principles.

# CHILD CARE LICENSING REGULATION: THE WHAT AND THE WHY

## Childcare Licensing Regulations

**Presenter:** Glenda Burrows has been an Early Childhood Educator (ECE) since 1985 and since receiving her ECE has been a member of Early Childhood Educators of BC, where she has been an active and long term Director of the Board, and continues to advocate for quality childcare and for educators to be appropriately compensated for their work. Glenda has worked in several early year's positions in her career, and these have taken her to many urban and rural communities, including remote fly in only to Indigenous communities. Glenda held several positions as an ECE, Program Manager and Supervisor in licensed childcare programs including a parent participation program in Burnaby, Community Childcare program in 100 Mile House and Prince George. Glenda worked in the Child Care Resource Program as a Coordinator and Training Coordinator in the interior before becoming a Licensing Officer for Northern Health, Interior Health and Vancouver Coastal health for a period of 26 years. When working for Interior Health, Glenda was seconded to the Ministry of Health in Victoria in 2005 to assist with the revision of the Community Care Facilities Licensing regulations for both residential and childcare. Glenda retired from her position as Senior Licensing Officer for Vancouver Coastal Health, North Vancouver, in 2023. Since retirement Glenda has worked for a non-profit agency as a childcare consultant.
